AVENUE COMMANDANT MARCEAU et RUE DE LA PREVOYANCE

Considérant que des travaux sur réseaux ou ouvrages de télécommunications rendent nécessaire d'arrêter la réglementation appropriée de la circulation, afin d'assurer la sécurité des usagers, du 11/07/2022 au 13/07/2022 AVENUE COMMANDANT MARCEAU et RUE DE LA PREVOYANCE

ARRÊTE

**Article 1 :** À compter du 11/07/2022 jusqu'au 13/07/2022, la circulation est alternée par feux, sur une longueur maximum de 30 mètres, AVENUE COMMANDANT MARCEAU et RUE DE LA PREVOYANCE.

**Article 2 :** La signalisation réglementaire conforme aux dispositions de l'Instruction Interministérielle sur la signalisation routière sera mise en place par le demandeur.

**Article 3 - Voies de recours :**

Tout recours contentieux contre le présent arrêté peut être formé auprès du Tribunal Administratif de Besançon dans les deux mois suivant la publicité de l'arrêté.

**Article 4 :** M. le Directeur Général des Services de la Ville de Besançon est chargé de l'exécution du présent arrêté qui sera publié au registre des arrêtés sur le site internet de la Ville conformément à la réglementation en vigueur.

The first part of the report, covering the period from 1950 to 1955, shows a steady increase in the number of cases reported. This increase is attributed to a number of factors, including the introduction of new diagnostic techniques and the growing awareness of the disease among the general public.

The second part of the report, covering the period from 1956 to 1960, shows a similar trend, with the number of cases continuing to rise. This is particularly true in the case of the more severe forms of the disease, which have become more prevalent in recent years.

It is interesting to note that the incidence of the disease has remained relatively stable in certain areas, despite the overall increase. This may be due to a number of factors, including the presence of a large population of carriers in these areas.

The following table shows the number of cases reported in each year from 1950 to 1960.

The data shows that the number of cases reported in 1950 was 120, which increased to 150 in 1951, 180 in 1952, 210 in 1953, 240 in 1954, and 270 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 300, which increased to 330 in 1957, 360 in 1958, 390 in 1959, and 420 in 1960.

The data shows that the number of cases reported in Area D was 40 in 1950, 45 in 1951, 50 in 1952, 55 in 1953, 60 in 1954, and 65 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 70, which increased to 75 in 1957, 80 in 1958, 85 in 1959, and 90 in 1960.

The data shows that the number of cases reported in Area E was 20 in 1950, 25 in 1951, 30 in 1952, 35 in 1953, 40 in 1954, and 45 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 50, which increased to 55 in 1957, 60 in 1958, 65 in 1959, and 70 in 1960.

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The data shows that the number of cases reported in Area F was 10 in 1950, 15 in 1951, 20 in 1952, 25 in 1953, 30 in 1954, and 35 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 40, which increased to 45 in 1957, 50 in 1958, 55 in 1959, and 60 in 1960.

The data shows that the number of cases reported in Area G was 5 in 1950, 10 in 1951, 15 in 1952, 20 in 1953, 25 in 1954, and 30 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 35, which increased to 40 in 1957, 45 in 1958, 50 in 1959, and 55 in 1960.

The data shows that the number of cases reported in Area H was 2,5 in 1950, 5 in 1951, 7,5 in 1952, 10 in 1953, 12,5 in 1954, and 15 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 17,5, which increased to 20 in 1957, 22,5 in 1958, 25 in 1959, and 27,5 in 1960.

The data shows that the number of cases reported in Area I was 1,25 in 1950, 2,5 in 1951, 3,75 in 1952, 5 in 1953, 6,25 in 1954, and 7,5 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 8,75, which increased to 10 in 1957, 11,25 in 1958, 12,5 in 1959, and 13,75 in 1960.

The data shows that the number of cases reported in Area J was 0,625 in 1950, 1,25 in 1951, 1,875 in 1952, 2,5 in 1953, 3,125 in 1954, and 3,75 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 4,375, which increased to 5 in 1957, 5,625 in 1958, 6,25 in 1959, and 6,875 in 1960.

The data shows that the number of cases reported in Area K was 0,3125 in 1950, 0,625 in 1951, 0,9375 in 1952, 1,25 in 1953, 1,5625 in 1954, and 1,875 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 2,1875, which increased to 2,5 in 1957, 2,8125 in 1958, 3,125 in 1959, and 3,4375 in 1960.

The data shows that the number of cases reported in Area L was 0,15625 in 1950, 0,3125 in 1951, 0,46875 in 1952, 0,625 in 1953, 0,78125 in 1954, and 0,9375 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 1,09375, which increased to 1,25 in 1957, 1,40625 in 1958, 1,5625 in 1959, and 1,71875 in 1960.

The data shows that the number of cases reported in Area M was 0,078125 in 1950, 0,15625 in 1951, 0,234375 in 1952, 0,3125 in 1953, 0,390625 in 1954, and 0,46875 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 0,546875, which increased to 0,625 in 1957, 0,703125 in 1958, 0,78125 in 1959, and 0,859375 in 1960.

The data shows that the number of cases reported in Area N was 0,0390625 in 1950, 0,078125 in 1951, 0,1171875 in 1952, 0,15625 in 1953, 0,1953125 in 1954, and 0,234375 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 0,2734375, which increased to 0,3125 in 1957, 0,3515625 in 1958, 0,390625 in 1959, and 0,4296875 in 1960.

The data shows that the number of cases reported in Area O was 0,01953125 in 1950, 0,0390625 in 1951, 0,05869375 in 1952, 0,078125 in 1953, 0,09765625 in 1954, and 0,1171875 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 0,13671875, which increased to 0,15625 in 1957, 0,17578125 in 1958, 0,1953125 in 1959, and 0,21484375 in 1960.

The data shows that the number of cases reported in Area P was 0,009765625 in 1950, 0,01953125 in 1951, 0,029296875 in 1952, 0,0390625 in 1953, 0,048828125 in 1954, and 0,05869375 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 0,068459375, which increased to 0,078125 in 1957, 0,087890625 in 1958, 0,09765625 in 1959, and 0,107421875 in 1960.

The data shows that the number of cases reported in Area Q was 0,0048828125 in 1950, 0,009765625 in 1951, 0,0146484375 in 1952, 0,01953125 in 1953, 0,0244140625 in 1954, and 0,029296875 in 1955. In 1956, the number of cases reported was 0,0341796875, which increased to 0,0390625 in 1957, 0,0439453125 in 1958, 0,048828125 in 1959, and 0,0537109375 in 1960.
